## **Latin Placement Assessment**

Optime! For the passages below, translate as much as you can without the use of any outside resources, including a dictionary, online resource, grammar textbook, tutor, or friend who studies Latin. If you don't know a word, make a guess! We just want to see what you can do on your own and we are not expecting perfect translations. The passages get more difficult as you go, feel free to stop when you think you have demonstrated your understanding to the best of your ability.

## I. Priam Visits Achilles

*After the death of the great Trojan warrior Hector, Priam, the king of Troy and father of Hector, visits Achilles tent to request that his son's body be returned to Troy.*

diū māter filium mortuum lūget; diū lūget Andromacheā, uxor Hectoris; diū lūget Priamus. tandem Priamus, ubi nox venit, ex urbe exit et sōlus ad Graecōrum nāvēs festīnat. deus Mercurius eum dūcit per vigileās Graecōrum. tandem ad Achillis tabernaculum advenit. intrat Achillemque salūtat; in terraā pōcumbit; “ō Achilleā, teōrō” inquit, “tandem ab irā dēsistete et filium mortuum ad mātrem miseram remitte.”

*luger* (lugeō, lugere) “to mourn” *Andromache* (Andromache, Andromachis, f.) “Andromache, the wife of Hector”

*Priamus* (Priamus, Priaīmi, m.) “Priam, the king of Troy”

*vigileā* (vigilis, vigilis, m.) “guard, watchman” *Graecorum* (Graeci, Graecōrum, m. pl.) “the Greeks”

*Achillis* (Achilleā, Achillis, m.) “Achilles” *tabernaculum* (tabernaculum, tabernaculī, n.) “tent”

*pōcumbit* (procumbo, procumbere) “to bow down”

*oro* (oro, oraēre) “to beg”

*dēsistete* (desisto, desistere) “to stop”

*remitte* (remitto, remittere) “to send back”

## Latin Placement Assessment II. Pompa!

*Quintus heads to Caesar's triumph.*

prīmō diē feriārum Quīntus prīmā lūce surrēxit festināvitque ad lūdum ubi amīcō occurrit. sine morā ad forum contendērunt. ibi iam aderat ingēns multitūdō, virī, fēmina, puerī, cīvēs et servī, pompam laetē exspectantēs. Quīntus numquam vīderat maiōrem multitūdinem quam illam. interdum senātor cum comitatū clientium per medium turbam perrūpit. interdum mulier nōbilis ad Capitōlium prōcēdēbat lectīcā imposta, quam ferebant octō servī. Quintus ad botulārium praetereuntem accessit plūrimosque botulōs ēmit; in gradibus templī sedēns botulōs avidē dēvorāvit

*feriārum* (feriae, feriārum, f. pl.) "holidays" *occurro, occurrere, occurri*(+ dative) "to meet" *mora-* (mora, morae, f.) "delay"

*aderat* (adsum, adesse, adfui) "to be present" *pompam* (pompa, pompa, f.) "parade" *comitatū*(comitus, comitatus, m.) "retinue, group"

*clientium* (cliens, clientis, m.) "client, dependent" *Capitolium* (Capitolium, Capitoliī, n.) "the Capitoline Hill"

*lecticā*(lectica, lecticae, f.) "litter"

*botularium* (botularius, botularii, m.)

"sausage seller"

*pratereuntem* (praetereo, praeterire, praeterivi) "to pass by"

*botulōs* (botulus, botulī, m.) "sausage" *gradibus* (gradus, gradūs, m.) "step"

### Latin Placement Assessment III. Caesar

*Caesar describes an animal that dwells on the German frontier and the interaction of the Germani with this animal.*

Tertium est genus eoīrum, quī uīrī appellantur. Hī sunt magnituīdine pauloīnfracē elephantoīs, specieī et colōre et figūraī taurī. Magna viī eoīrum est et magna velocitās, neque hominī neque ferae quam cōnspxērunt parcunt. Hōc seī labōre dūrant aduleſcentēs atque hōc genere vēnatiōnis exercent; et quiī plūrimoīs ex hīs interfēcerunt relatīs in pūblicum cornibus, quae sint testimōniō, magnam ferunt laudem. Sed assueſcere ad hominēs et mānsueſierī nē parvulī quidem exceptī possunt. Amplitūdoī cornuum et figūra et specieī multum aī nostroīrum boum cornibus differt. Haec studioīseī conquīſita, ab labrīs agrentō circumclūdunt atque in amplissimīs epulīs proī poculīs utuntur.

*tertium* (tertius, a, um) "third"

*uīrī* (uīrus, uīrī, m.) "aurochs" This is a wild ancestor of domestic cattle. It is believed to have been hunted to extinction in the 17th century. *appellantur* (appello, appellāre, appellāvī, appellatus) "to name"

*magnituīdine* (magnituīdoī, magnituīdinis, f.) "size" - imply the word "in" = "in size"

*pauloīnfracē* (+ acc.): "a little bit below (less than)" *ferae* (fera, ferae, f.) "wild beast"

*quam* (adv.) "as soon as"

*parcunt* (parcoī, parcere, pepercī, parsum) "spare" (+ dative)

*dūrant* (duroī, duraīre, duraīvī, duraītus) "to harden, toughen"

*seī* (accusative plural)

*et qui* (nominative subject) "and those who

*relatis* (refero, referre, retulī, relatus) "to bring back"

*cornibus* (cornū, cornū, n.) "horn"

*testimonio* (testimonium, testimonii, n.) "proof"

*assuescere* (assueſco, assueſcere) "to become accustomed"

*mañsueſieri* (mansueſio, mansueſieri) "to be tamed"

*nē parvuli quidem excepti* "not even if caught when young"

*amplitudo* (amplitudo, amplitudinis, f.) "size" *multum* (adv) "a lot, much"

*boum* (bos, bovis, m./f.) genitive plural = *boum haec* (neuter plural, referring to the horns) *conquisita* (conquiō, conquīrere, conquīſīvī, conquīſītum) "to seek out"

*ab labris* "at the edges"
